Introduction

The Eucharistic Prayer

Women and men were called to tell the story of your love and grace, but people have covered their ears and continued to walk another path. But continuing to seek us and draw us to yourself, you sent Jesus, to show us the way back to you.

We join our voices with those around the world today, and in the heavenly realm, offering our praise and thanksgiving

Holy, holy, Lord, God of power and might.Heaven and earth are full of your glory.Hosanna in the highest.Blessed is the One who comes in the name of our God.Hosanna in the highest.

We remember that Jesus, on the same night that he was handed over to torture and execution, took bread and gave you thanks; he broke it and gave it to his friends, saying:

Take eat, this is my body, my living presence, given for you. Do this to remember me.

In the same way he took the cup of wine and gave you thanks and gave it to them, saying: Drink this all of you; for this is my very life, spent for you.

Do this to remember me.

So today we share bread and wine together as a sign of our unity in the body of Christ, as a pledge that we will work for justice, and as a foretaste of that which can be despite what is and what has been. We pray that Your Spirit will be present amongst us here, and in this bread and this wine, that they may become the life of Christ within us, that our lives may lean towards justice, mercy and peace. Amen.
