Introduction

Baptism of Olivia Pohiva

Leader: Once when people brought their babies to Jesus to be blessed, the disciples wanted to send them away, but Jesus said, "Let the little children come to me, do not stop them, for it is to such as these that the kingdom of God belongs".

Luke 18: 15-17

Tupou and Semisi along with Tuitala, and your extended family we are glad you have brought Olivia to be baptised today.

Baptism is God's gift to us. It is God who takes the initiative; God chooses us. Long before we can understand or respond, God knows and loves each one of us and wants to be known and loved by us.

Baptism marks and celebrates the gracious, transforming work of God within us, not just in the moment of baptism itself but throughout the whole of life.

From the very beginning of the Christian community, people have been received into the church through baptism. Children belong in the community of faith which is centred on Jesus Christ. Through baptism they become members of the church, God's covenant people, and are united with Christians of every time and place.

Human life is marked by brokenness but forgiveness and new life in Christ are available to all who are open to receive them.

Little children do not understand this yet, but their parents and the church together affirm their faith in God and promise to nurture them in this faith, so that as members of the Body of Christ they may learn to love and serve God all their life.

Let us affirm the faith declared in our baptism:

All Stand

We are not alone – we live in God's world.

We believe in God:

who has created and is creating,
who has come in Jesus, the Word made flesh,
to reconcile and make new,
who works in us and others by the Spirit.
We trust in God.
We are called to be the church:

to celebrate God's presence, to love and serve others, to seek justice and resist evil, to proclaim Jesus, crucified and risen, our judge and our Hope.

In life, in death,

in life beyond death,

God is with us.

We are not alone.

Thanks be to God.

Please be seated. Tupou, Semisi, Tuitala, their family come forward with Olivia

Leader: Tupou and Semisi, what do you ask of the Church?

Parents: We ask that Olivia be baptised.

Statement of intent by parents

Leader: Tupou and Semisi, you have acknowledged with us your faith in God.

Do you now entrust Olivia to God's loving embrace?

Parents: We do.

Leader: Will you share in worship and the life of the church, so that Olivia will

always know she belongs within it?

Parents: We will.

Leader: Will you make your home a place where Christ is honoured and

where Olivia may grow in love and faith?

Parents: We will, with God's help.

Leader: Will you by your example encourage Olivia

to share in the celebration of Holy Communion

and the service of God in the world,

and to come to the confirmation of her baptism?

Parents: We will, with God's help.

Promise of the family

Leader: As the close family will you lovingly guide Olivia

and give your support to Tupou and Semisi, so that Olivia may grow in Christian faith?

Family: We will, with God's help.

Promise of the Congregation

Leader: As members of Christ's universal church you are about to receive

Olivia Pohiva into membership.

Will you surround Olivia and her family with love,

nurture and encourage her in the faith,

and with God's help make this a place where all may grow in the knowledge

and love of Christ?

People: We will. With great joy we welcome Olivia Pohiva into the church.

Congregation sits

The Baptism

Leader: Flowing water is the central symbol of baptism.

It is a sign of life and growth, of freshness and delight,

of cleansing and new beginnings, of God's Holy Spirit poured out on those who belong to Christ.

Water is poured into the font by the Parish Steward.

Leader: Eternal God,

we thank you for the gift of water. When nothing existed by chaos,

you swept across the waters of creation

and brought forth life;

when you saw your people as slaves in Egypt, you led them to freedom through the sea;

across the river Jordan you led Israel to the land you promised.

In the fullness of time you sent Jesus,
Nurtured in the waters of a womb;
in the Jordan he was baptised by John
and anointed by your Spirit;
at the well in Samaria he offered the gift of living water;
his followers are called to share the baptism
of his death and resurrection
and to make disciples of all nations.
By the power of your Holy Spirit,
Bless this water and Olivia Pohiva who is baptised in it,
that she may be born of water and the Spirit,
be raised to new life in Christ
and strengthened to serve you in the world.
To you be all honour and glory,
now and for ever. Amen.

Congregation stands

Olivia Pohiva, I baptise you in the name of the Father, and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit.

Olivia, from this day on the sign of the cross is upon you.
Remember always that you are a child of God.
Through the water of birth
You were brought into the world.
Through the waters of baptism
You have been brought into the church.

A candle, towel are presented by the Parish Steward.

A gift made by the children of the congregation is presented.

Leader: Olivia Pohiva,

walk in the way of Christ. Shine with the light of Christ.

The grace of Christ attend you; the love of God surround you; the Holy Spirit keep you, this day and for ever. Amen.

Congregation sits. Olivia is introduced to the congregation.

Leader: Let us pray:

We thank you, loving God, for the miracle of birth,

for the gift of children and the richness

that family life can bring. Bless Olivia and her family.

Give to Tupou and Semisi the faith and wisdom

to fulfil their responsibility.

People: We remember with gratitude

our own baptism. Help us to live lives

worthy of his high calling.

Leader: May your Spirit continually be at work in us so

that we may be channels of love and peace.

Amen.

Olivia Pohiva is entered in the baptismal register. The baptismal certificate is presented by the Parish Steward.

The parents and family members return to their seat
